# Rule Notification FY2324-12 - Dealing with dogs receiving repeated cards for interference

The AFA rules currently provide that the supervisory judge may report to the AFA committee any dog that receives repeated signal cards for interference leading to the assessment that the dog may be becoming a danger to other dogs. The dog incident sub-committee is then required to investigate and report to the AFA committee with recommendations.

Following discussion between the dog incident sub-committee and the supervisory judge about the practicality of the current process the AFA committee was asked to consider revising the process so that the dog incident sub-committee takes responsibility for reviewing reports of signal cards and identifying any dog which the sub-committee considers requires investigation with the supervisory judge being available to assist the sub-committee in the investigation.

The AFA committee agreed that the proposal would streamline the current process and result in any issues being dealt with more expeditiously. At its meeting on 6 May 2024 the committee resolved to amend the rules and the respective roles of the supervisory judge and the dog incident sub-committee respectively as set out below

The amendments are effective from 1 June 2024. The rules published on the AFA website will be updated shortly.

# **Rule Changes**

#### Amend rule 6.23

Note: The <u>dog incident sub-committeesupervisory judge</u> may report to the **AFA** committee, <u>with recommended actions</u>, any dog that receives repeated signal cards for interference leading to the assessment that the dog may be becoming a danger to other dogs. The **AFA** committee will deal with the report in accordance with Appendix 14.

#### **Amend Appendix 14**

The process in this Appendix is to be followed when the **AFA** committee receives:

- the AFA committee receives an allegation by a judge, AFA representative or other AFA member under rule 4.8 of aggression or suspected aggression by a dog at a flyball event and refers the allegation to the dog incident sub-committee; or
- the <u>dog incident sub-committee</u> identifies a report from the <u>supervisory</u>
  judge under rule 6.23 that a dog that has received <u>repeated</u> signal cards
  for interference on multiple occasions leading to an assessment that the
  dog may be becoming a danger to other dogs.

### InvestigationReferral to by dog incident sub-committee

In each of the above circumstances the *AFA committee* will refer the matter to the *dog incident sub--committee* to will investigate and provide a report with recommendations to the *AFA committee*.

# The dog incident sub-committee:

- may ask other AFA members to provide witness statements if it considers that is
  necessary or appropriate to ensure a full and fair analysis of the dog's behaviour;
- must invite the dog's owner to provide any statement or comment the dog's owner wishes to make in connection with the investigation;
- must make available to the dog's owner the relevant incident reports—or supervisory judge's report and all witness statements subject to the dog's owner undertaking to keep the reports and statements confidential and not release them to any other person;
- must consider all available evidence and take into account the length of time the dog has been racing and any prior incidents relating to the dog;
- must use best endeavours to report to the AFA committee with its decision and recommendation within 21 days after receiving athe referral from the AFA committee.

If the *dog incident sub-committee* finds an allegation of *aggression* to be made out, the *dog incident sub-committee* will have regard to the *AFA* Black Card Penalty Protocol in Table A14.1 in deciding on the appropriate penalty to recommend. To avoid doubt, the *dog incident sub-committee* may recommend a penalty which is not consistent with the *AFA* Black Card Penalty Protocol where it considers that to be warranted in the circumstances.

In <u>relation to a dog that has received repeated signal cards for interference</u>response to a report from the <u>supervisory judge</u>, the <u>dog incident sub-committee</u> may make any of the following recommendations:

- that no further action be taken;
- that a warning be issued indicating that any further incidents involving
  the dog may result in a period of suspension and a requirement for
  retraining (this recommendation will also normally include the
  requirement for the dog's **owner** to seek advice from the instructors at
  the dog's **club** on focus retraining);
- that the dog be placed on probation for a period of between three and 12 months with any incident of interference or aggression within this period to result in immediate suspension from participation in all flyball events for the balance of the specified period (this recommendation will also normally include the requirement for the dog's owner to seek advice from the instructors at the dog's club on focus retraining);
- that the dog be suspended from participating in **flyball events** for a period of between three and 12 months and the dog's owner seek advice on

- appropriate behaviour retraining;
- that the dog be permanently excluded from all flyball events (this
  recommendation will normally only be made when there are
  repeated incidents of aggression.

# Amend responsibilities of Supervisory Judge

When requested assist the dog incident sub-committee in its investigation of a dog that has received repeated signal cards for interference Report to the General Committee repeated instances of interference by a dog when considered appropriate.

# Amend responsibilities of dog incident sub-committee

Regularly review reports of signal cards issued by judges and linvestigate any dog that has received repeated signal cards for instances of interference as referred by the Supervisory Judge
